



PUPIL PREMIUM REPORT 2018/19

What is the Pupil Premium?

The Pupil Premium is additional money given to schools to enable them to support pupils who are disadvantaged in order to raise their educational achievement. The following groups of pupils are eligible for pupil premium funding: children entitled to free school meals, service children and looked after/special guardianship children. The free school meal category covers any child that has been registered for Free School Meals in the past six years. This is known as the 'Ever 6' model.

We use this funding to provide targeted support and intervention with the aim of narrowing the attainment gap between this group of children and their peers.

How was the money spent?

What was the impact on standards?

Whole School Progress Data for 2017/18:

Disadvantaged Pupils	Made 'Expected' Progress'	Made 'Above Expected Progress
Reading	85%	46%
Writing	78%	35%
Maths	92%	49%

This table demonstrates that the large majority of our Disadvantaged pupils made expected progress in Reading, Writing and Maths, with a high proportion making more than expected progress. Our use of Pupil Premium funding has therefore had a clear impact on the progress of disadvantaged pupils throughout the school.

How do we intend to spend the money?

The Pupil Premium funding has been put towards supporting the above initiatives. However it does not cover the full cost, the school tops up this funding from its own budget. The school has an internal Pupil Premium Provision Map which shows the specific support each individual child receives.

Monitoring

We regularly track and monitor the progress of our disadvantaged pupils and evaluate the impact of any spending. This allows us to be responsive and pro-active in trying out new strategies that will help to raise the attainment of Disadvantaged Pupils.
